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DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2015

The directors present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 July 2015.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Trust's governing document, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

The Trust's objects are set out in its Memorandum of Association and broadly are to seek to achieve, by charitable means, the promotion and welfare of the community and improvement and conservation of the local and cultural heritage.

Any Ordinary Member of the Trust may be nominated by another Member or by himself/herself for election to the Board at an AGM, there being an appropriate place at the time.

As per the Articles of Association of the Trust a maximum of nine elected directors is permissable, the minimum number being five. In addition, up to three individuals may be co-opted so as to ensure a spread of skills and experience within the Board.

The Trust's Equal Opportunities policy is implicit in this process.

None of the directors has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the directors are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up.

Tarbert and Skipness Community Trust is a company limited by guarantee and having no share capital, recognised by HM Revenue & Customs as a Scottish charity. The Trust's management is carried out by the relevant directors to achieve the objectives decided at board meetings.

The directors have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and activities

The policies adopted in furtherance of these objects are to expand membership, raise funds and apply for grant aid for specific projects.

In order to ensure the financial viability of the Trust a number of income measures have been put in place. There is a £10 annual membership of the Trust and the majority of members have paid their subscription. The Trust is ensuring that governance costs are included in applications for grant funding for projects undertaken. The Trust is developing a renewable energy project in the form of a wind farm, which, if successful may also provide an income stream for the Trust.

DIRECTORS' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2015

Achievements and performance Claonaig Bunkhouse

A project to develop Claonaig church into a bunk house was not successful as the property was sold. However, the Trust is actively looking at other sites close to the ferry terminal for development into a bunkhouse.

An Options and Appraisals Study is currently underway to appraise the project and identify the best site for the bunkhouse

Tarbert Harbour Amenity Area Play Area

The Little Gym is now complete and was formally opened on 7th November 2015.

Tarbert and Skipness Community Renewables Limited

Tarbert and Skipness Renewables Limited (SC470715) was incorporated on 24th February 2014. Tarbert and Skipness Renewables Ltd is the trading arm of Tarbert and Skipness Community Trust and has been established to invest in renewable initiatives and to receive benefit from those initiatives.

Tarbert and Skipness Renewable Ltd have invested in 6.5% of Sron Doire Wind farm over 20 years. Sron Doire windfarm has recently been commissioned and SSE has now agreed to full power switch on from November 3rd. Income generated from Sron Doire will, in the early years, pay back our RIEF loan. Any surplus above ongoing costs of the Trust will be directed to community benefit.

The Trust is in discussion with RES Freasdail Wind Farm over Community Benefit once that installation is commissioned.

Tarbert and Skipness Community Trust are mindful that other wind farm developments might be of community benefit to the Trust area.

Disbursement of Community Benefit

The Trust has developed policies for the disbursement of Community Benefit from renewable projects.

Former Tarbert Library

The Trust has registered interest in an Asset Transfer of the former Tarbert Library. This is a lengthy process but to date the Council has no objection to the Asset Transfer. The Trust would upgrade the building to use as office and display space as well as providing office space for rent.

Heritage Project

In partnership with Tarbert Castle Trust and Tarbert Harbour Authority the Trust is developing a Heritage Project based in harbour premises and other spaces throughout the village

White Shore Path

The White Shore Path requires repair and upgrading to provide greater access for all groups and individuals. Application will be made for an accurate survey of the path and options presented for the work required.

The Trust is also looking at a path connecting the West Loch to Corranbuie thereby creating a circular path from Tarbert Castle back to Tarbert via the forestry road and taking in the holiday park. The Trust also wants to upgrade paths in Skipness.

DIRECTORS' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2015

Community Plan

An annual development day is held to update the Community Plan which includes all the communities within the Trust area. In 2014 the Planning and Development Day was held on 8th November.

Partnerships

The Trust has active partnerships with Tarbert Harbour Authority, Tarbert Yacht Club, Tarbert Castle Trust, Tarbert Academy, Tarbert Academy Parent's Council, Tarbert Health Centre and Tarbert Enterprise Company.

Financial review

The results of the year's activities, the financial position of the company and the transfers to reserves are shown in the financial statements.

It is the policy of the Trust that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level which would enable expenses to be met as they fall due. The directors consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the Trust's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised.

The Trust ensures that all project funding to further the aims of the Trust contains an element of funding to contribute towards Trust expenses.

The Trust is registered for Gift Aid from subscriptions and donations.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

TO THE DIRECTORS OF TARBERT AND SKIPNESS COMMUNITY TRUST

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The Trust has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small Trust.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005.

1.2 Incoming resources

Grants are recognised in the period in which the claim falls due and are provided as a debtor as the need arises.

1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure on charitable activities is recognised as it is incurred.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

The individuals concerned waived this payment to them and donated the funds back to the Trust.

A reclassification of the £5,000 J Tyler gift has been made to treat this gift as restricted funds. This fund is classed by the trustee's as a "revolving fund" used to support cash flow of various projects for times when expenditure is incurred ahead of relevant grant claims.

The £4,730 transfer is the net impact of both the above transfers.
