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DIRECTORS' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 28 FEBRUARY 2017

The directors present their report and accounts for the year ended 28 February 2017.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Trust's governing document, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016)

Objectives and activities

The policies adopted in furtherance of these objects are to expand membership, raise funds and apply for grant aid for specific projects.

The directors have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Trust should undertake.

In order to ensure the financial viability of the Trust a number of income measures have been put in place. There is a £10 annual membership of the Trust and the majority of members have paid their subscription. The Trust is ensuring that governance costs are included in applications for grant funding for projects undertaken. The Trust has an interest in a renewable energy project in the form of a wind farm, which is beginning to provide an income stream for the Trust.

DIRECTORS' REPORT (CONTINUED)(INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 28 FEBRUARY 2017

Achievements and performance

Claonaig Bunkhouse

The Trust approached the Estate owner to buy the land for the proposed bunk house. Water supply was deemed to be an obstacle. Scottish Water was approached but they have no plans to upgrade the water system in the Skipness area. Until water provision is established this project has been stalled.

Tarbert and Skipness Renewables Limited

Srondoire Wind Farm

Srondoire Wind Farm became operational in October 2015. Dividends from Srondoire varies each year. In the early years the loan requires to be repaid to REIF and our dividend will be small. As this loan is reduced the dividend will increase. Other factors affect our dividend e.g. the wind and price paid for electricity generated.

RES Freasdail

RES Freasdail will become operational from March 2017. TSCT has signed an agreement with RES Freasdail to receive Community Benefit of £22,250 annually for 20 years. The first dividend is due in June 2017. Community Benefit may change in the future if the wind farm is sold on to another operator. Residents living within 5 kilometres of the windfarm will receive an annual payment towards their electricity bills.

Disbursement of Community Benefit

As a response to, and in anticipation of dividend receipts, TSCT set up their Community Benefit dispersal scheme which, in 2017, will deliver the first Community Benefit to Tarbert and Skipness groups fitting the criteria. There has been a public Information Meeting, and notice in the press and on the website. Information about the Community Benefit Scheme is available on www.tsct.org.uk

Former Tarbert Library

In November 2016 Argyll and Bute Council notified the Trust that the former library was to be put up for sale and that the Trust Asset Transfer request had been refused. In response the Trust is pursuing the Asset Transfer Request under the new Community Empowerment Act which came into force in January 2017.

Path Projects

White Shore Path

A survey on the White Shore Path revealed that visitors and residents wanted the path upgraded, rubbish removed and the bridge repaired. They did not, however want the intrinsic feel of the woodland walk changed. A small grant was secured from Paths for All. The grant, plus an enormous amount of voluntary work saw the bridge removed and burned, a culvert replaced and the bridge and a new path constructed. Improvements were also made on the path to the White Shore and steps have been replaced on the steeper parts of the path.

West Loch Path

Last year the Trust failed to buy the land required to develop a path from Carrick Cemetery to Escart Bay. An approach was made to BEAR. BEAR has produced a feasibility study for a joint use, pedestrian and cycle path, from Carrick Cemetery to Escart.

Regeneration Funding

In February 2016 Argyll and Bute Council announced £3m of funding for projects in Mid Argyll and Tarbert. This is a lengthy process and the Trust awaits information from the Council.

Tarbert projects that have made it through the initial screening process are:

- · Indoor Bowling facility
- · Upgrade Barmore/Garvel Road turning
- · Public realm improvements
- · Tarbert Harbour development

Community Plan

The Community Plan has been updated and covers the period 2016-2021. The plan is updated annually.

Financial review

The results of the year's activities, the financial position of the company and the transfers to reserves are shown in the financial statements.

It is the policy of the Trust that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level which would enable expenses to be met as they fall due. The directors consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the Trust's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised.

The Trust ensures that all project funding to further the aims of the Trust contains an element of funding to contribute towards Trust expenses.

The Trust is able to benefit from Gift Aid from donations.

The directors have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Structure, governance and management

The objects are set out in its Memorandum of Association and broadly are to seek to achieve, by charitable means, the promotion and welfare of the community and improvement and conservation of the local and cultural heritage.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 28 FEBRUARY 2017

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Tarbert & Skipness Community Trust is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in Scotland. The registered office is Loch Awe House, Barmore Road, Tarbert, Argyll, PA29 6TW.

1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Trust's Memorandum of Association, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The Trust is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Trust has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The accounts have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the Trust. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future with regular dividend income expected from its investment in Tarbert & Skipness Renewables Ltd. Thus the directors continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the Trust.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the Trust is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the Trust has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the Trust has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 28 FEBRUARY 2017

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Income from memberships are recognised on a cash basis in the year received.

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is all considered as expenditure on charitable activities and includes the cost of running the Trust as well as grants. Grants payable are charged in the year when the offer is conveyed and a valid expectation created with the recipient that the grant will be paid. Any grants awarded and not claimed are recognised as refunds in the year they are not claimed. All costs are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

1.6 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Fixtures, fittings & equipment

25% reducing balance

Computers

25% reducing balance

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

1.7 Non-current investments

Fixed asset investments are initially measured at transaction price excluding transaction costs, and are subsequently measured at fair value at each reporting date. Changes in fair value are recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year. Transaction costs are expensed as incurred.

A subsidiary is an entity controlled by the Trust. Control is the power to govern the financial and operating policies of the entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities.

1.8 Impairment of non-current assets

At each reporting end date, the Trust reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment annually, and whenever there is an indication that the asset may be impaired.

1.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.10 Financial instruments

The Trust has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the Trust's balance sheet when the Trust becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include trade and other receivables and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including trade and other payables and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade payables are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade payables are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the Trust's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the Trust's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
